#### **Primary Playground Additions**

In 2019, our then Stage 2 students completed a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths) unit of work. Throughout the process, their Teachers (Mrs Edwards, Mrs Fowler, Mr Lipscomb and Mrs Willis) were receiving professional development from the University of Sydney's STEM Teacher Enrichment Academy to develop units of work that would engage students in STEM activities and learning opportunities.

For this unit, students were tasked with planning, designing and implementing a new sensory garden space for the OAGS playground. Students worked in collaborative teams to research the needs of the school community, appropriate plants and materials and cost effective designs, with a view to creating garden spaces that represented the 4 Houses -

Biladurang, Bandhaa, Dinawan, Gugaa. After a term and a half of work, the model gardens created by our Stage 2 students were amazing!

As a cohort, students selected their favourite designs and these were presented to the School Executive for implementation. With the assistance of the OAGS P&F and an Australian Federal Government







Local Schools Community Fund grant, the beginning stage of the garden has now been completed in the Primary playground near the morning "Kiss and Drop" bay. The main elements of the student designs have been incorporated in this early stage - the river bed (Biladurang), a crushed sand pathway (Dinawan), red gum seating (Bandhaa), a garden bed with a variety of leaf shapes and textures (Gugaa) and the all-important cubby house. There are plans for the introduction of further elements in the future. A massive thank you must go to Mr Jarrett for his tireless work to make the Stage 2 student's ideas come to life.



The benefits of STEM learning are vast, including early exposure to scientific fields of work, improved critical thinking skills, increased ability to work collaboratively and the creation of additional links between real life and the learning curriculum in school. Research has regularly found that all students can benefit from opportunities to explore and engage in STEM activities when they are presented by experienced and passionate educators. Our efforts with Stage 2 last year certainly supported the findings of the research. So much so, that STEM learning is now occurring in all stages across the Primary school and into the early Secondary school journey of OAGS students. Look out for new student designs, projects and proposals appearing within the school in the future!

#### **Early Learning**

The holidays are with us, and with the current situation less families are travelling so I thought I would share with you the benefits of spending quality time with your child, as well as some different ideas for spending time together. The importance of spending quality time with your child can not be overstated. Time together is how you get to know about each other's experiences, thoughts, feelings and changing interests. Time together also shows that you value and appreciate your child, which is great for your relationship. It is not necessarily about the amount of time; it is about being present and with them.

Be active with your children. Run around at the park, play chasey or tip, set up obstacle courses around the home or in the garden, take up skipping, do some dancing or go for a ride around Lake Canobolas. Alternatively ask your child to make up a game that makes their heart pump fast. They will have some great ideas and they love being the one that knows the rules.



Library visits are fun and a great source of new books for sharing at bed time. A book that is new to me is 'I Wonder' by <u>Kari Anne Holt</u> and is full of wonders such as: What do clouds taste like?, Do my toys miss me when I'm gone?, and I wonder if cars and trucks speak the same language; great things to discuss with your curious child. Orange Regional Library also has recordings of picture books that your child might like to listen to. You can find them <u>here</u>. Cooking is another fun thing to do with your child during the holidays. When children are involved in cooking they may be more likely to try new foods, and it is a great way for them to contribute to the family. You could also make a game of it by creating your own Junior Master Chef Competition.

Spring is here, so maybe you could do some gardening. Some children love seeing things grow, looking at the bugs or just

helping about in the garden. We have some keen gardeners in Transition who love pulling weeds, planting seeds and watering the plants. If you are out and about in the garden or park, maybe your child could collect some natural materials and be creative. Here is an idea I found on one nature <u>art website</u>. There are hundreds of nature craft websites online if you are looking for inspiration. Regular Craft activities are also a great way for your child to express themselves, be creative and solve problems. They can do a lot with very simple materials.



Finally, remember children don't need to be entertained all the time, boredom is good for children. By pushing through boredom and entertaining themselves, kids learn to think more creatively and hone their problem-solving skills. Boredom also promotes resilience, as they learn to get through something that, to a child, can feel tough or stressful.

I am sure you all have wonderful ideas on how to spend quality time with your child, enjoy your time, it passes very quickly. Most importantly, enjoy the holidays and stay safe and healthy.

#### **Maths Olympiad**

Over the last 5 months, students from Stage 3 have enjoyed tackling the Australasian Problem Solving Mathematical Olympiads (APSMO) for 2020 (aka the 'Maths Olympiad'). The team has been meeting up before school every Wednesday morning to develop important mathematical problem solving skills in a safe, supportive and risk-taking environment. Students have certainly needed to think outside the box when attempting each problem!

The Olympiads consisted of 5 separate contests held approximately a month apart from each other, giving us plenty of scheduled time for practising and improving in between each Olympiad.

Skills that we explored included finding patterns and relationships, drawing scenarios, working backwards, trial and error, making logical lists and developing algebraic formulas. Here's an example of one of the more challenging questions that students were faced with, where



each letter represented a digit and students were required to work out what each letter in the word 'SEUSS' represented:




