## Remembrance Day

This year to commemorate Remembrance Day, the entire OAGS school community descended on Robertson Park in which a number of our students participated in this somber occasion. Be it poetry from Isla and Josh, set pieces by the school choir or Isabella's rendition of the National Anthem, our students rose to the occasion and did both our school and Orange proud. Through many weeks of meticulous planning, research and preparation, Adelaide delivered a stirring Keynote Address, which beautifully threaded the needle between past, present and future. As such, it is an honour to include her speech in this week's Newsletter:



"... all my dreams before my helpless sight, He plunges at me, guttering, choking, drowning."

These were the words of Wilfred Owen in his poem 'Dulce Et Decorum,' as he recounted his traumatic experiences during the First World War.

I found it both a challenge and an honour to undertake the task of writing and presenting this speech today. I have always been intrigued by the ways in which seminal events influence generations to come. I knew that I wanted to delve deeper into the history of the First World War, and so decided to focus my LEAP major project last year on the origins of

the Great War, as I felt this World War was given less credit than its latter counterpart. I discovered that these traumatic events are so often started by a range of different rationales and perspectives.

By the end of the Nineteenth Century, Europe was in a toxic state, riddled with secret alliances and reigned by leaders with militant, nationalistic views. This ultimately led to an intense environment in which every individual, in every country, was prepared, and patiently awaited the world to be forced into a ferocious war. The assassination of Franz Ferdinand in 1914 was the flashpoint that tipped all nations into this war that would never be forgotten, a war in which we are standing here today to remember.

I often find that the Great War, the war that was believed to result in peace and unity among the nations is continually disregarded in our society. We frequently forget the integral role this war played in sculpting our modern world, and by doing so, it becomes so eminently difficult for us to consider why we stand the minute of silence to commemorate this event one hundred and one years later.

Together, we stand here today to remember the 40 million lives that were lost during World War One. Including the 62,000 Australians who died, the 156,000 Australians who were wounded and the 416,809 Australians who bravely served their country during this melancholy and disaster stricken time. However, these figures are easily mistaken for just numbers sitting on a page, or an account of misplaced objects. No, every number represents a brother, a father, a son, your best mate, your work colleague, your cousin, your uncle, your grandfather and so on. These numbers don't even include the thousands of women who served as nurses, factory workers and in support of troops at home and abroad. Each of these Australians were alike to you and me, just living their day-to-day lives, standing up for what they believed in, and protecting one another with an imperishable bond. The bravery, mateship, comradery and selflessness shown by these individuals is something never to be forgotten. It is something we shall raise high and honour each and every year, and it acts as an inspiration for our lives today. That we should not only commemorate these diligent soldiers, but see them as role models, whose spirits live on, even after their physical existence is gone.

The effects of World War One are widespread and evident in our society today. The very park we are standing in was established as a testimonial for our brave soldiers, and memorials such as these are found in every town and city across Australia. RSL's are important institutions nationwide that were founded after the Great War, these clubs now unite communities and act as meeting places for many. We shall also never forget the soldier settler schemes that shaped the settlement patterns of country Australia, and moulded the agriculture industry in ways that still remain today. Every one of these effects from the First World War has made a lasting dent in our society that will remain indefinitely.

I have recently been fortunate enough to have had the opportunity to visit the battlefields of Gallipoli. This experience was tremendously moving and put the full scale of war into perspective. After seeing row upon row of both Australian and Turkish soldier's gravestones, all in which died side by side, it became very real. To think that friend and foe, whom had never met, were caught up in a blood-thirsty mess far beyond their understanding, and whom were slaughtering one another for the simple prize of freedom. Luckily today, we have learnt the lesson from our ancestors, and are able to use hindsight and wisdom to prevent traumatic wars such as this one from ever erupting again.

At 11am, on the 11th day of the 11th month, Australians, and people from across the world have commemorated their courageous soldiers who served and died for the liberty of their country. It is so crucially important that these soldier's valiant souls are never forgotten, for if it weren't for them, we would not be standing here today, living the lives we live, in the country in which we live.





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## Snake bite

**IN A MEDICAL EMERGENCY CALL TRIPLE ZERO (000) FOR AN AMBULANCE.**

**DRSABCD** Danger ▶ Response ▶ Send for help ▶ Airway ▶ Breathing ▶ CPR ▶ Defibrillation  
The DRSABCD Action Plan is the first step when providing first aid. Use this to assess the immediate situation.

All known or suspected snake bites must be treated as potentially life-threatening, and medical aid should be sought urgently.

### WARNING

Do not wash venom off the skin or clothes because it may assist identification.

### SIGNS AND SYMPTOMS

Signs of a snake bite are not always visible and, in some cases, the patient may not have felt anything. Symptoms may not appear for an hour or more after the person has been bitten.

Depending on the type of snake, signs and symptoms may include some or all of the following:

- immediate or delayed pain at the bite site
- swelling, bruising or local bleeding
- bite marks (usually on a limb) that may vary from obvious puncture wounds to scratches that may be almost invisible
- swollen and tender glands in the groin or armpit of the bitten limb
- faintness, dizziness
- nausea and vomiting
- headache
- abdominal pain
- oozing of blood from the bite site or gums
- double or blurred vision
- drooping eyelids
- difficulty in speaking or swallowing
- limb weakness or paralysis
- difficulty in breathing
- occasionally, initial collapse or confusion followed by partial or complete recovery.



### WHAT TO DO

- 1 Follow DRSABCD.
- 2 Call triple zero (000) for an ambulance.
- 3 Lie the patient down and ask them to keep still. Reassure the patient.
- 4 If on a limb, apply an elasticised roller bandage (10–15 cm wide) over the bite site as soon as possible.
- 5 Apply a further elasticised roller bandage (10–15 cm wide), starting just above the fingers or toes and moving upwards on the bitten limb as far as can be reached.
- 6 Use clothing or other material if an elasticised roller bandage is not available.
- 7 Apply the bandage as tightly as possible to the limb.
- 8 Immobilise the bandaged limb using splints.
- 9 Keep the patient lying down and completely still (immobilised).
- 10 Write down the time of the bite and when the bandage was applied. If possible, mark the location of the bite site (if known) on the skin with a pen, or photograph the site.
- 11 Stay with the patient until medical aid arrives.
