## **Bullying No Way Day**


**National Day of Action Against Bullying and Violence Special Assembly: Wednesday March 11. 12.55 - 1.20**



Bullying prevention is everyone's responsibility.

Countering bullying involves the whole school community. Each person in the school community has an important role. At OAGS the stage is set for student involvement at our annual Bullying NO WAY DAY Assembly. This event has established itself as an important occasion in our school calendar and the willingness of students and families to engage and contribute has resulted in a positive experience.

To create and sustain student engagement in anti-bullying initiatives we are providing meaningful roles for them to engage in. Students do not inherently know how to be meaningfully involved in their schools. Likewise, most educators struggle to figure out how to meaningfully involve students. Meaningful student involvement requires focused action that allows all participants to learn the potential of their individual and collective roles. For students, developmentally appropriate learning in class in the weeks leading up to Bullying NO WAY DAY will be presented to increase their capacity for empowered participation. Using the high-quality and evidence-informed educational resources from the Bullying, No Way! Website in our classrooms we believe that we are in a good place when it comes to preventing bullying at OAGS.



## **Improved Outdoor Space at the Senior Study Centre**

The commencement of Year 11 marks the beginning of an important phase in the life of any school student. At that point, students are less than 2 years away from completing their schooling and their academic studies are now 'gearing up' as they begin preparing for challenging assessments, exams and in time, their HSC Examinations.

Several years ago the school recognized the need for students in years 11 and 12 to have an area where they can focus on their academic studies. A space that enabled them to work uninterrupted and yet be in close proximity to welfare leaders who can both oversee their learning and get alongside them during what is often a particularly stressful and demanding stage of life. In February 2018 the Senior Study Centre was born.



Since 2018 we have seen our Secondary School continue to grow and this year we have our largest group of year 11 and 12 students progressing through the school. Last week an outdoor area adjacent to the Senior Study Centre was opened up with new furniture to provide students with additional space to relax in during morning and afternoon breaks: times when the Senior Study Centre is often at its fullest. We hope that this will enable students to enjoy time away from their books when they are in between lessons.

Year 11 and 12 we look forward to you making good use of this great area.

## All Schools Triathlon

On Tuesday 25th February, 15 students travelled to Penrith to compete at the NSW All Schools Triathlon Championships. 7 students competed in their very first individual triathlon on the Wednesday at the Penrith International Regatta Centre. The day started with Jackson, Tom and Josh in the Senior Boys event. The boys showed true grit and determination to complete the 750m swim, 20km cycle and 5km run. Bayden and Jess were up next in the Intermediate Division. Both Bayden and Jess raced hard and fast to produce excellent results, in the 600m swim, 15km cycle and 4km run. Our final athletes of the day were Keegan and Elli in the Junior Division, who completed a 400m swim, 10km cycle and 3km run. Keegan showed true determination after all competitors in his race were stopped half way through the bike leg. After an hour the junior girls started with Elli racing hard from start to finish and Keegan was back onto the bike to finish the rest of his race looking strong. Wednesday afternoon meant athletes were able to catch up on much needed rest, before bonding together at our team dinner.

Races kicked off at 8:20 am Thursday morning, starting with the OAGS Junior Boys and Girls teams. Both teams worked well together, improving their results from the CIS Triathlon Championships last year. Next was the OAGS Intermediate Boys team, who had a strong race from start to finish. To end the day the OAGS Senior Boys and Girls teams raced in hot and humid conditions. The Senior Boys team had a strong race finishing inside the top ten in the CIS Division. The Senior Girls had a great race with all team members improving their times from last year's CIS event.

All students made OAGS proud with their determination and enthusiasm throughout the event, showing true sportsmanship both on and off the course. Cadets with rank continue to develop their skills as they "grow" into their roles and responsibilities. They are now more involved in the planning and delivery of training plus administration. A coordination meeting occurs each week after our Monday parade to look at the weeks ahead.



## Learning about the Past in Kindergarten


