Harmony Day at OAGS

As I passed the Media Centre on Monday I heard the visiting musicians playing with our very own musicians. Together in concert, they produced a very pleasing and beautiful sound. We associate the word 'harmony' most often with music. Harmony comes about when different notes, voices or musical instruments come together and produce a pleasing sound. It is about different players being in the right relationship with each other.



Building strong and harmonious relationships is a challenge for us as individuals, as young Christian people and as an Australian nation. If any of us ever feel like not coming to School its usually not because we don't like what we are learning or doing at school, but because our relationship with our teacher or our friends are sometimes a little broken or they feel awkward and difficult.



Establishing and maintaining good relationships takes work and it takes time. We need a long list of virtues: courage, humility, sensitivity, understanding, empathy, openness, honesty, trust, faithfulness, patience, good humour, willingness to admit to wrongdoing, readiness to forgive, and so on. When we practise the right relationship, we learn from, and are changed, by each other.



Cultural diversity is rapidly becoming the norm in Australia. Some of us are finding it hard to adjust. But adjusting is part of our Christian calling. Bonding only with people who are related to us or who look like us and share the same beliefs and customs is not enough. As Jesus asked long ago, 'Why should God reward you if you love only the people who love you? Even the tax collectors do that! And if you speak only to your friends, have you done anything out of the ordinary? Even the



pagans do that!' (Matthew 5:46-47 GNB) He urges us to meet, befriend and become good neighbours to people who are different from us. He wants us to be like God, who sends his love and peace to everyone through Jesus.

We will continue to communicate any relevant information relating to the Covid-19 pandemic as we are advised further in the approach to our return. Please have a safe and restful break with your family and we look forward to welcoming the students back on Monday 12 July along with the fourteen new students starting with us day one Term 3.

One of our favourite lessons in Equip this term was watching a video of Chris Nikic speak about his story of having down syndrome and how he got through his hard times. This was our favourite lesson because we liked how he completed his goal of being the first person with down syndrome to do a full Iron Man competition, under the time cap. His story really demonstrated how resilient he was. A tip to the school community we want to share is, never give up on your goals no matter how difficult they may seem!



Not only did we learn a lot about how to be resilient, we learnt about conflict management, anger management, tips to be assertive and more of the VIA Character Strengths. Resilience is a great strength to have - it means to be able to bounce back from difficult situations.

Out of what we learnt this term the two things we found the most interesting besides being resilient, was conflict management and anger management. The five different animals we use to express in conflict management are:

- Owl - collaborating
- Fox - compromising
- Teddy bear - accommodating
- Turtle - avoiding
- Shark - competing

To deal with anger management, we learnt about headspaces RAGE 'PAPA', (Passive, Aggressive, Passive-aggressive and Assertive.) These are the four common faces of anger that people use to respond to conflict or stressful triggers. We should always try to be assertive and stand up for ourselves as well as others, and definitely try not to be aggressive or passive-aggressive.

Dung Beetles- Helping our Climate, Fertilising our Farms

OAGs and Landcare launched a joint program last week raising Dung Beetles as part of a research project monitoring the breeding of winter active dung beetles *Bufus bisoni*.

If this sounds like poo to you here's a few facts;

- Dung beetles reduce chemical use by burying manure under the ground so parasites can't climb up grass and infect grazing animals.
- Dung beetles improve soil structure by allowing water to enter the soil via the channels they have created - reducing runoff and erosion. This has a "flow on" effect of improving water quality by preventing manure and artificial fertilisers entering out waterways.
- Dung beetles improve soil fertility by burying this valuable resource in the soil where it can be used by microorganisms and plants.
- Dung beetles sequester carbon by incorporating it into the soil - this helps combat climate change.



What are we doing?

The school has 9 test cores with a mixed sex population of dungbeetles in each. Each core has an onion bag to keep the beetles from straying and each bag is topped with a fresh cow pat. These cores will be pulled up and the larvae counted to measure reproductive rates.



In the meantime, thanks to the kind gents of the Cowra Men's Shed, a main nursery frame contains a larger dung beetle sample with lots a tasty manure which our students monitor and replenish regularly.

In about a year, these beetles will be used to repopulate local beef farms to help manage manure as many beetles have been killed as a result of ivermectin based drenches.

NSW Rural Fire Service School Cadet Program

During Term 2, the NSW Rural Fire Service School Cadet program was offered to year 9 and 10 students as a sport option. The NSW RFS School Cadet program aims to:

1. Develop an interest in the NSW RFS and its traditions.
2. Give students a foundational knowledge of firefighting skills and discipline.
3. Develop the qualities of leadership, self-discipline, self-reliance, initiative and teamwork.
4. Provide training that will introduce students to NSW RFS Firefighting and Officer training.
5. Provide students with the knowledge of fire safety and preparedness.
6. Encourage students to continue service in the NSW RFS or other community services.

During the program, students learnt about the fundamentals of the RFS, engaged in some basic firefighting skills (using pumps and hoses), learnt about the science behind fires, practised using fire extinguishers, developed evacuation plans, conducted property assessments, made stretches to transfer injured teddy bears, learnt about the management of fires, the importance of communication in the RFS, and the different aviation that is available for fighting fires.

It has been great seeing the students engage with each activity, learn new skills and develop a greater understanding of the NSW RFS.

I have enjoyed sharing my knowledge with the students, and introducing the students to an organisation I am passionate about.

I would like to thank the other NSW RFS volunteers who gave up their time each week to assist with the program and help train the students. Without them, programs like this would not happen.
